In the late nineteenth

century, new opportunities for education and social advancement were opening up, and Jewish minorities took particular advantage of them, leading to widespread resentment. At the same time, newly created nation-states, especially in the east, were striving for ethnic homogeneity and national renewal, goals which they saw as inextricably linked. Drawing upon a wide range of previously unpublished sources, Aly traces the sequence of events that made persecution of Jews an increasingly acceptable European practice. Ultimately, the German architects of genocide found support for the Final Solution in nearly all the countries they occupied or were allied with. Without diminishing the guilt of German perpetrators, Aly documents the involvement of all of Europe in the destruction of the Jews, once again deepening our understanding of this most tormented history.

In this beautifully realized study, Peter Schäfer investigates the origins of a female manifestation of God in Jewish mysticism. The search itself is a fascinating exploration of the idea of a feminine divinity. And Schäfer's surprising but persuasive conclusions yield deeper understanding of the complex but frequently intimate relationship between Christianity and Judaism--and of the development of religious concepts more generally. Toward the end of the twelfth century, a small book titled the Bahir (Light) appeared in Provence. The first document of Judaism's emerging kabbalistic movement, it introduced a completely new view of God, one that included a divine potency that was essentially female. This female divinity was portrayed both as a mediator between Jews and God and as part of the Godhead itself. Examining Judaic history from the biblical Wisdom tradition to the Middle Ages,

Schäfer finds some precedents for the Kabbalah's feminine divinity. But he cannot account for her forceful appearance in twelfth-century southern France without reference to the immediate Christian environment, particularly the flourishing veneration of the Virgin Mary. Indeed, twelfth-century Jews and Christians were simultaneously rediscovering the feminine as an aspect of the Godhead after having abandoned it in favor of either an abstract, disembodied God or an exclusively male one. In proposing that the medieval cult of Mary--rather than eastern Gnosticism--is the appropriate framework for understanding the feminine elements in Jewish mysticism, *Mirror of His Beauty* represents a sea change in Kabbalah and Jewish-Christian cultural studies. It shifts our attention from the Byzantine East to the Latin Christian West. And in contrast to histories that treat the development of Judaism and Christianity in isolation, it leads us to a fuller understanding of Jews and Christians living in

proximity, aware of each other.

Strangers at Our Door - Zygmunt Bauman

Refugees from the violence of wars and the brutality of famished lives have knocked on other people's doors since the beginning of time. For the people behind the doors, these uninvited guests were always strangers, and strangers tend to generate fear and anxiety precisely because they are unknown. Today we find ourselves confronted with an extreme form of this historical dynamic, as our TV screens and newspapers are filled with accounts of a 'migration crisis', ostensibly overwhelming Europe and portending the collapse of our way of life. This anxious debate has given rise to a veritable 'moral panic' - a feeling of fear spreading among a large number of people that some evil threatens the well-being of society. In this short book Zygmunt Bauman analyses the origins, contours and impact of this moral panic - he dissects, in short, the present-day migration

panic. He shows how politicians have exploited fears and anxieties that have become widespread, especially among those who have already lost so much - the disinherited and the poor. But he argues that the policy of mutual separation, of building walls rather than bridges, is misguided. It may bring some short-term reassurance but it is doomed to fail in the long run. We are faced with a crisis of humanity, and the only exit from this crisis is to recognize our growing interdependence as a species and to find new ways to live together in solidarity and cooperation, amidst strangers who may hold opinions and preferences different from our own.

The Value of Privacy - Beate Rössler 2015-10-08

This new book by Beate Rössler is a work of real quality and originality on an extremely topical issue: the issue of privacy and the relations between the private and the public. Rössler investigates the reasons why we value privacy and why we ought to value it. In the context of

modern, liberal societies, Rössler develops a theory of the private which links privacy and autonomy in a constitutive way: privacy is a necessary condition to lead an autonomous life. The book develops a theory of freedom and autonomy which sees the ability to pose the “practical question” of how one wants to live, of what a person strives to be, at the centre of the modern idea of autonomy. Egypt - The Lost Homeland: Exodus from Egypt, 1947-1967 - Alisa Douer 2015-09-25

In the twentieth century, the political Zionist movement and Egyptian rulers completely uprooted the country's thriving Jewish community - a goal the Pharaohs tried to realize as early as 3500 years ago. Mostly comprised of descendants of Sephardim from the Iberian Peninsula, the world's oldest Jewish community totaled 85,000 members in 1948. No more than

100 to 200 Jews live in Egypt today. This book tells the story of Egypt's Jewish history from Biblical times to 1967, the year of one of the last major Jewish emigration waves from Egypt. It highlights the First Exodus in ca. 1500 BCE and the Second Exodus, which was triggered by the foundation of the State of Israel and three successive wars in 1948, 1956, and 1967.

Throughout the narrative, it becomes evident that the Jewish community consistently was subject to the arbitrary will of Egyptian rulers. Starting in 1948, members of this community were forced to leave the country without any of their belongings on short notice. Like other Jews from the Arab world, Egyptian Jews were not Zionists in the Eurocentric, Ashkenazi sense. Their arrival in Israel was met with prejudice and disdain. Even though they were discriminated against in matters of housing and education, they still managed to integrate well into Israeli society and are now members of the country's upper and middle class. The evidence

presented in this book is based on interviews with ninety-six Egyptian Jews in Israel and the United States.

Ägypten - die verlorene Heimat - Alisa Douer

Was dem Pharaon vor 3500 Jahren nicht gelungen war, gelang dem politischen Zionismus und die ägyptischen Machthaber: das Ende einer prachtvollen jüdischer Gemeinde. Die weltweit älteste jüdische Gemeinde, die großteils von Juden aus der iberischen Halbinsel abstammte - 'Sephardim', die im 15. Jahrhundert in Ägypten Zuflucht fanden, umfasste 1948 ca. 85000 Personen; sie wurde zur Gänze ausgelöscht. Heute leben in Ägypten ca. 100-200 Juden. Die Geschichte der Juden in Ägypten seit biblischen Zeiten circa 1550 BC (erster Exodus), bis 1948-1956-1967 AD (zweiter Exodus), der im Zuge der Gründung des Staates Israel begann und mit den drei Kriegen gegen Israel endete, wird erzählt und analysiert mit den Höhen und Tiefen die den Juden in Ägypten zuteil wurden.

Sie waren der Willkür der Herrscher immer ausgeliefert. Ab 1948 wurden sie des Landes verwiesen, mussten ihr Hab und Gut hinter sich lassen und mit einer kurzen Vorwarnung das Land verlassen. Die ägyptischen Juden, so wie andere aus der arabischen Welt, waren keine Zionisten im Sinne des 'aschkenasischen' eurozentristischen Zionismus. Vorurteile und Missachtung, Diskriminierung und Benachteiligung im Bezug auf Wohnorte und Ausbildung war ihr Schicksal in Israel. Dennoch hatten sie die Integration sehr gut bewältigt und gehören heute zur Mittleren und Mittel-Oberschicht des Landes. Das Buch stützt sich auf Interviews mit sechshundneunzig ehemaligen Ägyptern in Israel und den USA.

Judeophobia - Peter Schäfer 2009-06-01

Taking a fresh look at what the Greeks and Romans thought about Jews and Judaism, Peter Schäfer locates the origin of anti-Semitism in the ancient world. *Judeophobia* firmly establishes Hellenistic Egypt as the generating source of

anti-Semitism, with roots extending back into Egypt's pre-Hellenistic history. A pattern of ingrained hostility toward an alien culture emerges when Schäfer surveys an illuminating spectrum of comments on Jews and their religion in Greek and Roman writings, focusing on the topics that most interested the pagan classical world: the exodus or, as it was widely interpreted, expulsion from Egypt; the nature of the Jewish god; food restrictions, in particular abstinence from pork; laws relating to the sabbath; the practice of circumcision; and Jewish proselytism. He then probes key incidents, two fierce outbursts of hostility in Egypt: the destruction of a Jewish temple in Elephantine in 410 B.C.E. and the riots in Alexandria in 38 C.E. Asking what fueled these attacks on Jewish communities, the author discovers deep-seated ethnic resentments. It was from Egypt that hatred of Jews, based on allegations of impiety, xenophobia, and misanthropy, was transported first to Syria-Palestine and then to Rome, where

it acquired a new element: fear of this small but distinctive community. To the hatred and fear, ingredients of Christian theology were soon added--a mix all too familiar in Western history.

There Is No Such Thing as Cultural Identity -

François Jullien 2021-05-28

As people throughout the world react to globalization and revert to nationalism, they are proclaiming distinct cultural identities for themselves. Cultural identity seems to offer a defensive wall against the homogenizing effects of globalization and a framework for nurturing and protecting cultural differences. In this short and provocative book, François Jullien argues that this emphasis on cultural identity is a mistake. Cultures exist in relation to one another and they are constantly mutating and transforming themselves. There is no cultural identity, there are only what Jullien calls 'resources'. Resources are created in a certain space, they are available to all and belong to no one. They are not exclusive, like the values to

which we proclaim loyalty; instead, we deploy them or not, activate them or let them fall by the wayside, and each of us as individuals is responsible for these choices. This conceptual shift requires us to redefine three key terms - the universal, the uniform and the common. Equipped with these concepts, we can rethink the dialogue between cultures in a way that avoids what Jullien sees as the false debate about identity and difference. This powerful critique of the modern shibboleth of cultural identity will appeal to anyone interested in the great social and political questions of our time.

The Holocaust and Memory in the Global Age - Daniel Levy 2006

Daniel Levy and Natan Sznaider examine the forms that collective memory take in the age of globalisation. They explore how the Holocaust has been remembered in Germany, Israel and the US over the past 50 years and demonstrate how this event has become detached from its precise context.

Handbook of Prejudice - Anton Pelinka 2009
This book, which emerged from conversation at the Institute of Conflict Research in Vienna, contains twelve carefully researched and well-

written essays on the timely topic of the problem of prejudice. The contributors were chosen for their scholarly expertise in their particular fields. Taken together they provide an interdisciplinary approach, each casting light from a different angle on the problem of prejudice. The book is divided into two parts. Part one explores six particular manifestations of prejudice: anti-semitism; sexism and heterosexism; prejudice against the sick, old, and handicapped; religious prejudice; racism; and social class prejudice. Part Two further illuminates these prejudices by focusing upon them through six theoretical lenses: history and art history; social functionalism; social psychology; bioscience; law; and contemporary language behavior. Von Jerusalem zu Aelia Capitolina - Christopher Weikert 2016-06-13

Im Jahr 70 n. Chr. wurde Jerusalem bei der Niederschlagung des Jüdischen Aufstands von den Römern zerstört. Die Gründung der römischen Kolonie Aelia Capitolina an ihrer Stelle löste den Bar Kochba-Aufstand (132-136)

aus, dessen Rom nur mühsam Herr werden konnte. Neben diesen Ereignissen legt der blutige Aufstand der jüdischen Diaspora (116-117) nahe, dass das Verhältnis zwischen Römern und Juden in diesen Jahren außergewöhnlich schlecht war. Die vorliegende Studie untersucht die römische Politik gegenüber den Juden in diesem Zeitraum umfassend anhand der disparaten Quellen, aus denen bis heute sich widersprechende Hypothesen zur Erklärung der krisenhaften Entwicklung gebildet werden. Den Sieg über die Juden rückte er aus legitimatorischen Gründen in den Mittelpunkt seiner Außendarstellung, um seinen gewaltsamen Griff nach der Macht in der öffentlichen Wahrnehmung zu überdecken. Judäa, das als

Zentrum und Heimat der Juden bisher weitgehende religiöse Autonomie genossen hatte, wurde nun immer mehr wie die übrigen Provinzen des Römischen Reiches behandelt. Bei

konservativen Juden stieß diese Entwicklung, die aus römischer Sicht in der Regel verwaltungspolitischen Notwendigkeiten folgte, ohne bewusst antijüdisch zu sein, zunehmend auf Widerstand.
